



This annual school production will take place from Tuesday 11th February to Thursday 13th February. Whilst on the topic of productions, our Year 7 Christmas Concert is to be held on the evening of Wednesday 18th December 2013. Your support at such events is always much appreciated.

There are also performances which have already taken place this term. In October **'Harmonize'** (our singing group) pictured above performed in St. Giles Church in Newcastle. Six schools took part in the 2013's 'Paint The Town Pink' event, which was part of a breast cancer campaign. In December, Harmonize are also due to perform at Freeport, in Talke.

The New Intake Evening, as held on 19th September, was a huge success. Year 6 pupils and their parents got involved in a wide range of activities, some of which included sampling the food prepared by our GCSE Catering students, watching (and taking part in) Science experiments, watching Drama performances, producing their own creative writing, and the list continues. A number of prospective pupils entered various competitions on the evening, including a creative writing competition, where budding writers were invited to select at random an object from a box and write about their chosen object with creativity and accuracy. We would like to forward our congratulations to all pupils who won the various competitions – we hope this certificate will be the first of many Sir Thomas Boughey certificates received by these pupils.

On 21st November, we were pleased to hold our annual Awards Evening: a formal and very important event, where we celebrate the many successes of our pupils. This year we were honoured to have Mr. Andrew Topham as our guest speaker. Being an ex-pupil of the school, it was wonderful to hear him talk about his many achievements in life and preparing for his next immense challenge: his trek across the South Pole in 2014. Mr. Topham is the team coordinator for this British South Pole record attempt and it was amazing to hear about the challenges ahead, and his rigorous training programme. He really is a true example of how success is driven by ambition, preparation and sheer hard work.

For the first year, we were also pleased to introduce our Thorley Platt Award at this event. In the June and September 2013 editions of Audley Community News, it was explained how we were incredibly fortunate to have received a sum of money from Mrs. Thorley Platt. For those of you who didn't read the articles, unfortunately Mrs. Thorley Platt passed away in 2011, and it was her request that when her estate was sold. the local schools (primary and secondary) would each receive a sum of money to be spent on improving the education of young people. In order to remember Mrs. Thorley Platt's immense generosity, we decided to put some of that money to fund the award. which is aimed at recognising the work in the community.

In years gone by, our Awards Evening has been an opportunity to recognise the achievement of pupils both past and present. It is the evening where Year 11 pupils who left the previous summer collect their official GCSE certificates and current pupils receive awards for a wide range of categories. However, this year we decided, through the **Thorley Platt** Community Award, to recognise the work of people within our community, not simply our pupils. We felt this was a very fitting award, given we as a school value the work of our community, and is in honour of a lady who invested so much time in the local community.

Every year, Awards Evening helps to emphasise the far-reaching talents of our pupils, which extend to life beyond school. We have pupils who have recently appeared as extras in soap operas, and in the professional productions of 'Miss Saigon' and 'Guys and Dolls'. Many of our musicians have also gained great success in various fields, including achievements from Grade 1 to Grade 8 in musical examinations, and a Year 11 pupil has won a number of national titles, including Young Guitarist of The Year Award and Nickelodeon Rising Star Award.

We are very proud of the achievements of our pupils, both academic and extracurricular, and we are certain that they will continue to impress.


Chancel Repair Liability - St. James' Church Audley

The Responsibility of certain Property/ Land owners to fund repairs to the chancel of our church of St. James the Great, Audley.

It all started with the matrimonial affairs of Henry V111 when he decided to remove the authority of the Pope from our religious buildings and took control of all the associated lands. This was known as the dissolution of the monasteries.

Each church was set up with income or Tithes from the lands within their parish to support the running of the church. Over time many of these tithes have disappeared or have been incorporated into other responsibilities and hence not appropriate. However, some still remain and in the original parish of Audley, there are 74 plots of land that have the responsibility of supporting any required repairs to the chancel (area where the priest or vicar carries out his duties) of the church in Audley.

Under the 2002 Land Registration Act, there is a responsibility identified for the local Parochial Church Council (PCC) to locate these plots of land and register the responsibility of the current owners with the land registry office. This could come as a very unpleasant surprise to land owners or dwelling owners who have property



The next problem was to locate the plots of land and this was done taking copies of part of the map of our parish (located at Stafford and Lichfield Archives) showing the division of the total area of the parish into plots.

This map below left was produced in 1838 from many other records but is now recognised as the prime source.

The map consists of 2 sheets about 20 feet by 8 feet showing 2560 plots altogether but only 74 of these were of interest.

Other pertinent features were also recorded such as roads or tracks and any buildings so as to help recognise where these plots are when looking at a modern map

but it must be remembered that these were the features of the area in 1838. Opposite is the area of the centre of the village where it can be seen that Wilbraham's Walk does not exist.

The next objective then was to locate these plot outlines on a modern day map and this meant recording accurately the shape of the plot together

with its orientation, scale etc together with pertinent features to help identify its current location. Some of the boundaries of the plots line up with current boundary features such as hedges and roads etc but many have had their boundaries changed as fields have been made bigger or roads changed. For example, two of the plots cut across the M6 motorway.

Altogether, 10 maps have

been created showing the location of the 74 plots of land. A small section of one of these maps is shown below with the plots over laid on a current view of the area.

Some of the plots are between Audley Road and Merelake Road (Talke) with more lower down the hill towards Dunkirk. Another swathe of plots are towards the Alsager boundary and around Higher Foxely Farm. There are more plots around Knowlebank Road and across to Shraley Brook with others on the edge of the parish around Heighly Castle. There is one plot in Talke Pits



no longer part of Audley Parish which has 23 properties on it thus sharing the responsibility.

To take this project to a conclusion and register responsibilities would take a considerable amount of money from the PCC but to be legal would need to be completed by October.

The PCC have made a decision not to register this claim due to the financial cost to complete but also because it would be contrary to the Pastoral endeavours of the Church's Ministry. It is also worth noting that we consider the Chancel part of the church to be in a good state of repair and unlikely to need any work requiring to be carried out in the near future.

So all land owners and property owners in the parish of Audley can be relieved that they are free of any responsibility due to Chancel Repair Liability.



Achievement For Local Primary School

Dear Editor

I was idly searching on the internet when I came across a copy of one of your magazines dating back to 2008. After contacting you it was reassuring to find out that the magazine was still a successful editorial and I was wondering if the story below would be of interest to your readers.

My father, John William Rowley was born in Halmer End in 1913 and lived as a child in Victoria Place, Miles Green. He was the son of a miner who worked at the Minnie Pit where many of his relations sadly died in the mining disaster in January 1918.

Opposite you can see a photograph which I recently found of my father and uncle and 3 other boys dressed in running kit who were members of the Ravens Lane Old Scholars Club Harriers. I guess it was taken in the late 1920s.

From left to right the runners are:

Norman Crosby, Herbert Rowley (uncle), Sidney Riley, John (Jack) Rowley (father) and George Davies.

My father left work in the Minnie Pit to join the army in 1932 and was posted to India for what was known as "The Emergency" - trying to keep the peace in the North West Frontier between India and Afghanistan. Some things never change!

On his return in 1938 he lived briefly in Halmer End and was married to Rosa Johnston in 1940. He was then recalled into the army and after his war service he joined the Metropolitan Police Force in London. In 1948 his wife, Rosa passed away after contracting TB. In 1949 he met and married Joan, my mother, and I arrived in 1951.

My father was a very private person and my mother Joan, my sister Joan and I knew little about his childhood and army service, apart from it was very tough. Consequently we have very few photos of his vounger years. Fortunately I have found another photograph that was taken some time around 1935 that shows from left to right, my great grandmother Eliza Jervis (1863-1939), my grandmother Eliza Ann Rowley (nee Jervis 1897 to 1935). my aunt Ann (Nancy) Capper (nee Rowley 1911 to 1970) holding my cousin Peter Capper (1934).

I do hope some of this information may be of interest to anyone who may be researching their family tree concerning the above names and I would welcome any information or photographs they may have which may be relevant to my family.


Brother Terry would like to thank everyone who has



St. James' Church Wall response.

A Bright Future for Our Responders

As Christmas guickly approaches we start to look at a new year plan for the future. 2013 has proved a good year so far for Audley responders and Coordinator Paul Sargent, who is looking to secure the future of the volunteer service supplied by the dedicated responders of the area. As well as receiving much needed funds to continue the lifesaving work, Paul has also gone to the rescue of Kidsgrove First Responders who were in the process of ending their service which was previously run by St Johns Ambulance. By running both groups in conjunction with each other, this will provide many opportunities and

the continuation of the service in both areas.

So far in 2013 Audley Responders have been activated to 174 "999" calls in the area which is all made possible by the dedication of the volunteers and the funds from the community. Aspire residents from Durber Close, Kelsall Way & Maddock Street have decided to help raise funds for the responders as a continued project.

Coordinator Paul said "it is through help such as the residents fundraising that we are able to provide the lifesaving service as we are totally self-funded".

The responders are beginning to increase their numbers with new volunteers and also those returning to the area. With the new responders coming on board this will help to keep a good level of cover in the area. With winter approaching there will be an increase in calls for which such a service will be greatly welcome.

Audley responders also provide training to the community with the emergency life support Heart Start course which is a FREE 2 hour training course aimed at those 10 years and above which has recently been given too Audley Scouts. The course has been put together and supported by the British Heart Foundation and taken on by West Midlands Ambulance Service.

The fifth annual

Charity poker tournament (fancy dress) was held on Sept 28th 2013.

It was probably back in the Halmer End carnival days of the 60s and 70s that I last saw so many Armed Forces personnel gathered at the Railway Inn. In those days it wasn't uncommon to see members of the Red Arrows, the Army Display Team or members of the Parachute Regiment enjoying a pint and on Saturday 28th September those memories came flooding back.

I was one of 13 of the 18 entrants in this, the 5th annual Charity Poker Tournament who had dressed up in

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A Lifetime in the Navy My Early Years David Lovatt MBE.



In issue 41, we told the story of David's life as a boy living in the village and his decision to join the Navy. We now continue with his story as to what Navy life was really like in the 1960s.

On Monday morning 17th April 1967 I bade farewell to my parents and boarded a PMT bus in the village for the careers office in Hanley. I recall chatting to Michael Fairbanks on the bus as he was on his way to High School. Once in Hanley I purchased a newspaper for the long train journey down to London, and then to lpswich to join the training establishment HMS GANGES at Shotley point on the convergence of the Rivers Orwell and Stour. The back page headlines showed that Stoke had signed Gordon Banks the England goalkeeper. It was a wrench to miss seeing him and the team but I had made my decision and off I went. Little was I to realise that my association with the RN would last for 39 vears.

GANGES (Motto: Boys into Men) was the training establishment for 2000 15 year olds. I was one of 200 or so boys joining every 5 weeks. Interviewed on arrival whilst still in 'civvies' it was the last opportunity to back out of 'signing on' for boys time until age 18, then 9 years man service which would take you to age 27. It was a big commitment, and at that time there was no right to purchase your release. Once signed on, it was a quickly regimented routine, mess and bunkbed assigned in the new entry annex, then over to the kit store for an overwhelming amount of oversized kit - best uniforms, working kit, down to underwear, razor, sewing kit etc.

Few personal possessions were allowed and all our civilian wear we arrived in was parcelled up and sent home. Accommodation and all the facilities were basic, and designed to prepare us for living in the cramped conditions of a warship. Strict discipline and rules covered every aspect of life - it was even a disciplinary offence not to attend meals, because each day's routine from dawn to dusk encompassed a wide range of demanding activities which built up our stamina and strength, and punishments made Ken Taylor's cane akin to an itchy palm. Training was divided into three equally important parts. Education: (Maths, English, Naval History and Navigation). Technical training: (Morse code, Flags and their meanings, Typing, Radio Operations and Procedures. Finally, Naval General Training: (Marching Drill, firing weapons, boat work on the river, Seamanship, and numerous sports). The only method of contacting home was mail, and we eagerly looked forward to the arrival of letters. A few of the boys got seriously homesick and totally regretted their enlistment. Relief came after a few months, when the right to purchase release was introduced, for the sum of $\pounds 20$.

Each mess had an old fashioned radio as a means of entertainment and we were blessed with excellent reception from the pirate radio station Caroline which was anchored not too far away in the North Sea. There were some serious challenges, like climbing the majority of the 143 foot high mast with no safety harness should we slip!

But overall it was enjoyable and we were a happy bunch for which we were rewarded with 30 shillings (£1.50) pay each week!

After almost 4 months of training I went home for my first long leave of 4 weeks and had quite a shock. All the activity had given me a growth spurt. I was several inches taller and my joining medical weight of 93 pounds (6 stone

9lb) had increased, so that none of my civilian clothing fitted. So it was off to Newcastle to get something to wear after constantly being in uniform. As in past vears. 2 weeks in August were spent at Blackpool thanks to the generosity of Dad. In the sole company of males since enlisting I was fortunate to meet up with Pat and Sue, two Yorkshire lasses of similar age. After two weeks together we exchanged addresses and became pen pals for a couple of years and I did meet up and go out with Sue for a period. However, communications was not as instant as today and I was busy travelling. Little was I to know that our paths would cross 20 years later, which would eventually see us getting married in 1994. There was also the opportunity to see Stoke, with a draw against Sheffield United and a resounding 3-0 win over Manchester City.

Back at Ganges in early September it felt like the initial months had been the hardest and although there were challenges ahead and still lots to learn, living with a bunch of lads had brought us together as a team and we were all determined to pass out of Ganges together in the Spring. Pirate Radios were being outlawed and at the end of September we would have the corny jokes and music from Tony Blackburn on the newly launched Radio 1 as our entertainment. The highlight of the autumn term was a weekend trip to Ostende, Belgium in the MV Bembridge. We were all assigned duties and tasks as the small boat wallowed in the swell on a blustery day. Not only was it the first sea trip but also the first visit to a foreign country for most of us.

Christmas and then Spring came and after a passing out parade we moved onto HMS MERCURY, the RN's Signal Communications School set in the Hampshire countryside. Leydene House as it was known and the 600 acres of mainly woodland had been the home to a family who had made their fortune in the linoleum business. The rose bed at the back of the house was laid out in the pattern of their best selling linoleum. When Portsmouth became heavily bombed during World War II, the MOD requisitioned the estate and slowly the camp grew into a large establishment

with a mix of old Nissan huts which were heated with coke stoves and modern buildings. A main public road ran through the camp and there were no fences and little security. We had 6 months of in depth Signal training on radio equipment and a coding device which must have been based on the German ENIGMA machine. We also increased our morse code reception to 20 words per minute. Some of the things we had to do during our duty days were right out of 'Dads Army'. Because we were so far away from the nearest Fire Brigade station, we had an initial action to attempt to extinguish any fire. This was exercised every day. A large wooden handcart which housed a diesel pump, plus hoses, fire extinguishers etc., had to be pulled at top speed to the designated 'fire', with a few hanging onto the back as the brake!. Once their hoses etc. were set up to fight the imaginary fire. However, the diesel was a devil to start and on many occasions the exercise was never completed. The other duty was the 'Bike

Patrol'. This was carried out throughout the night and one might be unlucky enough to be allocated 0200 to 0400! There was no bike, just a tin helmet, torch, whistle and a small pick helve which would deter few. The patrol was

carried out singly, and consisted of selecting a route card at random, which could involve a walk into the depth of the woods to a remote building just to check the locks and windows were secure, then to sign a chit to substantiate the visit. It was a little scary, especially as the woods were full of wildlife with plenty of sounds.

Towards the end of our course we submitted our 'dream sheets' - what type of ship we would like to join and where it would be serving. I had no preference of ship, so submitted 'Any ship in the Far East Fleet'. Successfully completing the course it was sheer delight to be drafted to the Assault ship HMS Intrepid to commence its second commission in Singapore.


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
